Independence Week- May 7th-11th.



Independence Week was a very successful initiative last year, with children taking increased responsibility for their learning, organisation and belongings. We would like to implement another Independence Week in week 4 of this term, beginning Monday 7th May.

Independence is one of the PYP Attitudes. It is very important that children are developing the skills that they need to tackle a range of tasks so that their confidence and resilience are developing as they grow. During Independence Week, we will be encouraging the children to 'have a go' at tasks before they ask for assistance.

We are seeking parents' support during Independence Week. We would like to encourage independence from the start of the school day and so we are asking that parents please support us by following these guidelines:-

Junior Unit – parents may accompany their children to their classrooms but please encourage the children to unpack their bags and organise themselves for the day without assistance.

Middle Unit – children should be entering their classrooms independently. Parents need not be in the classrooms.

Senior Unit – children should enter the school independently. Parents need not be in the Senior Unit building. This is a step towards the transition to secondary school where students generally enter the schoolyard unaccompanied.

Parents of Senior and Middle Unit students are encouraged to write notes in their children's diaries should you need to follow up with the teacher. Alternatively, please contact the office if there is some information that you would like us to follow up. Obviously, urgent matters need to be brought directly to the teacher's attention. It is with great excitement that we show you the design for our new Saplings Choir Uniform. The Grade 4s are learning about Pentatonic (5 note) scales and using these to make their own songs. The Grade 5s have commenced a Bucket Drumming Unit and are working towards completing their listening assessment. All of the classes currently studying music will perform in our instrumental concerts later this term.

Sustainability - we all have the ability to sustain our planet for future generations to enjoy!

A visit from Costa Georgiadis, The water cycle, protecting animal habitats and commemorating ANZAC ...

We are looking forward to Costa from Gardening Australia visiting our school on the morning of May 11th to launch International Awareness Compost Week.

Grade 2 have developed an understanding of the need to conserve water and the four main **stages** in the **water cycle**. They are evaporation, condensation, precipitation and collection. Condensation is when **water** vapour in the air cools down and turns back into liquid **water**. Precipitation occurs when **water** (in the form of rain, snow, hail or sleet) falls from clouds in the sky.

The environment in which an **animal** lives in is referred to as its **habitat**. A **habitat** is a place where living things live and how they survive in that area. **Habitats** are homes, and everyone needs one! **Animals** have basic needs for air, water, food, shelter, and space. Understanding animal habitats and preserving them has been our inquiry focus in Grade 6. **Habitat conservation** is a management practice that seeks to **conserve**, protect and restore **habitat** areas for wild plants and animals. We have discovered that the greatest threat that faces many **species** is the widespread destruction of **habitat**. The best way to **protect** endangered **species** is to **protect** the special places where they live. Wildlife must have places to find food, shelter and raise their young.

Through Phil Cummins book, ANZAC Biscuits we have commemorated ANZAC by making ANZAC Biscuits. They were DELICIOUS! Rosemary—a symbol of memory was harvested from our garden and carried by our students into our ANZAC Day service, donated to Food is Free and to the RSL for use in their commemoration services and gatherings on ANZAC Day.

Keeping kids safe in a cyber world

Social media sites have taken cyber bullying and harassment to a new level. Here's how to keep your kids safe when online.

Cyber bullying is one of the biggest, safety issues facing young people today. Bullying and harassment online is now commonplace. For instance, over a third of teenage girls have been sexually harassed via the Internet.

The emergence of social media sites has seen cyber bullying go to a new level. Messages and images can now spread like wild fire reaching a huge potential audience in the time it takes to upload an image or shoot off a text message.

Once the family home offered young people an escape from schoolyard bullies. Now the cyber world is so invasive that their bedrooms offer no guarantees of safety any more.

The cyber world is enticing. Young people have always wanted to escape from their parents' world. In the past they hung out in shopping centres and pool halls. Parents tried their best to keep an eye on where their children were and what they were doing.

The online world is now the shopping mall of the 21st Century. Parents have the same responsibility to help kids stay safe in the online world as they do in the real world. 'Stranger danger' and accompanying safe behaviours are just as relevant in the online world as they are in the real world.

Parents should use the same offline preventative strategies to maximise their children's online safety as they've always used. These strategies include: teaching children about the right way to behave online; don't let them spend all night in the cyber world; and ask questions about what they are doing and where they go when they're online.

Parents need to remind kids that things in the online world can spin out of control very quickly. A written message or an image can be circulated electronically so rapidly that the scope and scale of cyber bullying can be greater than any other form of bullying.

The following seven key messages form the basis of an online safety strategy for kids. They should be taught to kids so they become second nature, just as the messages about stranger danger were absorbed by an earlier generation.

Respect others

Make kids aware that what they send can offend. Discuss with kids the types of messages and images that can

cause harm to others when sent. Teenagers often walk a fine line with what they do and say to each other offline, yet it's relatively harmless. The same type of behaviour online however can be a different story.

Think before you send

Remind kids cyberspace is a very public and permanent forum. A text message or image sent to just one person can be passed to a potentially unlimited number. Once they are sent they're almost impossible to erase and take back.

Treat online passwords like your house key

Teach kids to keep passwords guarded at all times. Young people can be incredibly trusting of each other, which is to be encouraged. However there are some things, such as online passwords that they don't share, not even with their best friend.

Block bullies

Teach kids to block bullying messages. They can filter out messages and addresses online. Similarly, they can block text messages from bullies as well.

Don't reply to harassment

Bullies can retain proof of your response, which can further be spread around. Besides responding to bullying behaviour often simply encourages the bully to continue.

Save the evidence

If kids are bullied they should keep the pictures and offending messages. These can be used as proof if the bullies are brought to justice.

Tell someone

The insidious part of bullying is that kids on the receiving end often don't seek help, as they think there's something wrong with them. Talk with kids about going to a trusted adult, when they feel their rights or safety have been violated. They should with your help report online bullying to the appropriate service provider.

Sticking the proverbial head in the sand regarding kids' use of communications technology is no longer an option for parents. Savvy parents need to learn as much as they can about children's and young people's online lives so they can respond to situations appropriately..
